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Three new councils

- **Greater Oxford Council** – covering Oxford and its immediate surroundings.
- **Northern Oxfordshire Council** – covering most of the existing Cherwell and West Oxfordshire districts.
- **Ridgeway Council** – covering most of the existing South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse districts combined with West Berkshire.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

After a lot of speculation and preparation, the government disclosed its 'minded-to' decision for the unitary authority format for Oxfordshire's local government on July 16th.

From April 1st (ahem - yes, that is the date), 2028, the County will have three unitary authorities as above. The Greater Oxford Council boundary (proposed by the current Labour controlled City Council) closely follows the line of Oxford's Green Belt. Currently, almost all of Oxford's Green Belt – which was created in 1975 – sits outside the city's administrative boundaries. Greater Oxford would cover a region with a population of about 240,000 people today, rising to about 345,000 by 2040.

The 3councils.org website says: *"The Greater Oxford proposals would give local residents control of the Green Belt for the first time. The government has been clear that some of the 'Grey Belt' – defined as "poor quality" areas of the Green Belt – in England should be developed to help deliver 1.5 million new homes over the next five years. This will be a big change for Oxfordshire.*

Rather than incrementally building around every town and village across the county, as is currently the case, Greater Oxford can ensure that high-quality, suitably dense

and sustainable developments are built near to existing jobs and community facilities, with good public transport.”

This includes the entirety of this Division.

It amounts to a huge land grab by the City Council in order to build. Currently, we have been told that there will be no challenge possible to this structure. If so, the government proceeds to an SCO (Structural Change Order) in the Autumn of this year when this will become official. Elections for councillors for the three bodies will take place in May 2027 when they become shadow authorities which will take over services in April 2028.

Tim Bearder (the new Leader of the Lib Dem controlled County Council) has written to Andrew Burnham firmly stating that he does not think this plan a good one. It is worth pointing out that small Unitaries are known to fail financially and with Oxfordshire being split into three, each of the Unitaries is under the governmentally desired level of 500,000 residents – Northern Oxfordshire (265,000) and Greater Oxford (240,000k) substantially so. The Ridgeway unitary will be larger with 430,000 residents but Berinsfield and Garsington Division will no longer be part of that.

The numbers of Councillors planned to represent residents under this arrangement is currently under review by LGBCE (Local Government Boundary Commission for

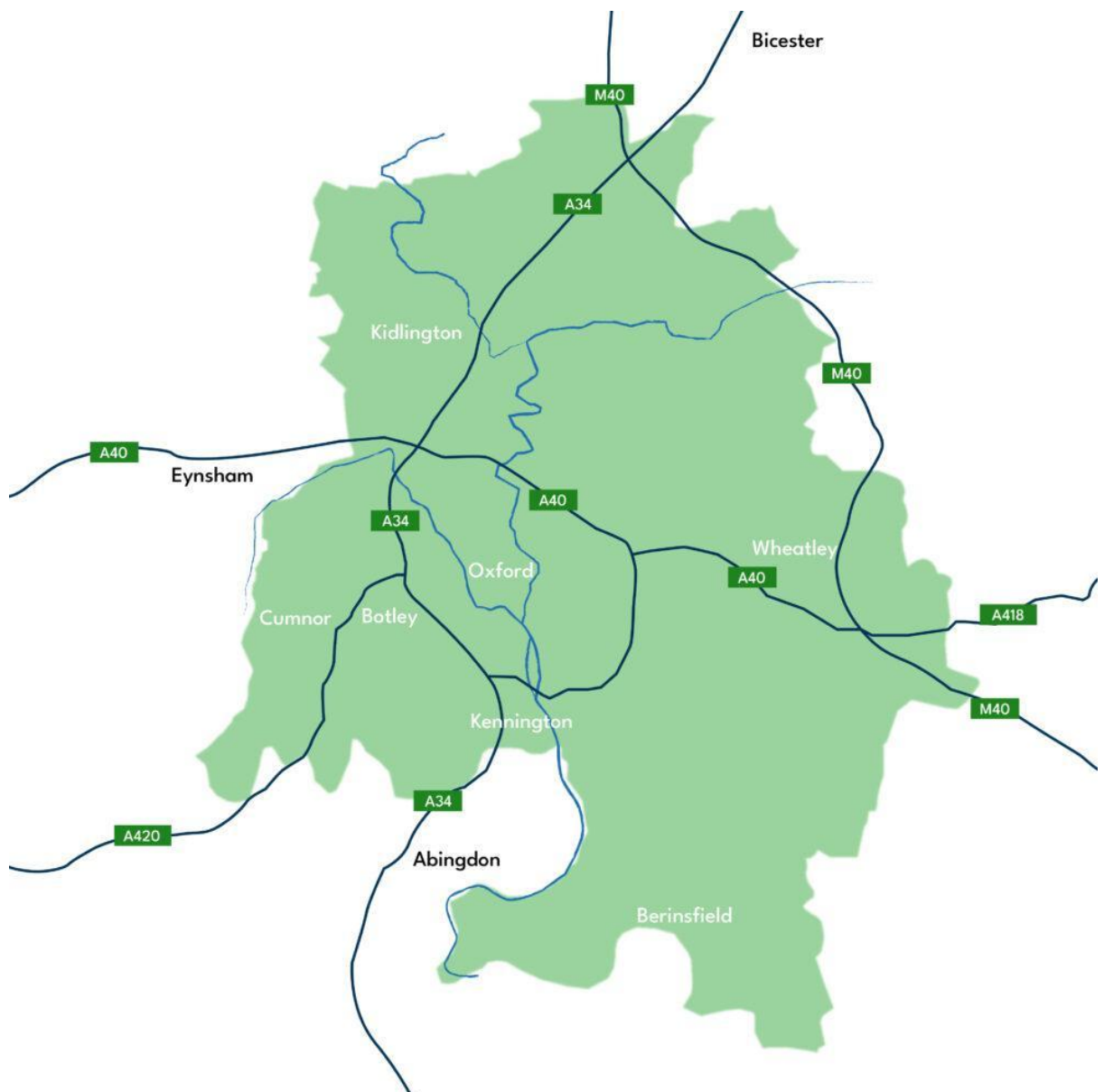
England) in order to create 'electoral equality'. The ward boundaries are also under review to the same end. Estimates based on standard unitary ratios of one councillor per 4 to 5,000 residents are currently:

72 for Ridgeway Council

60-65 for Northern Oxford Council

54-60 for Greater Oxford Council
